Created in April 2018, by the descendants of Ernest and Claire Heilbronn, who were deported by Convoy No. 69 and murdered in Birkenau, this Foundation, under the aegis of the Shoah Memorial, a Foundation of public utility, aims to reward those who, through their work and research, contribute to the history of the Jews in France, education against racism and anti-Semitism, and the history of the Second World War in France.

The jury and the founding members of the Ernest and Claire Heilbronn Foundation award three prizes each year in March: The Prize for a doctoral scholarship on the history of the Jews in France to a doctoral student in the process of completing his or her thesis, endowed with 9,000€. The Prize for Education against Racism and Anti-Semitism to a high school teacher to finance a study project on these themes with his or her class, endowed with €5,000. The Prize for a history book on the Second World War, endowed with 3,000€.

The scholarship is open to all doctoral students, whether French or foreign, working on a subject related to an aspect of the history of the Jews in France from the Gallo-Roman era to the present day. This non-renewable grant is endowed with 9,000€.

The presentation file must include a detailed CV of the doctoral student and a 4 to 6 pages summary of the research themes of his or her thesis.

The winners will be informed during the month of February.

These prizes and the attached scholarship are awarded in the presence of the jury and the winners in the auditorium of the Shoah Memorial on March 7 or 10 of each year.

Prizes awarded since 2019 for the doctoral scholarship on the history of the Jews in France:

2019 Prize: to Ms. Delphine Richard for her PhD: "Jewish prisoners of war in France, 1940-1945".

2020 Prize: to **Mrs. Emmanuelle Polack** for her PhD: "The paradigm of the art market in Paris during the Occupation 1940-1945" and to Mr. Alexandre Doulut for his dissertation: "The Shoah in France. Change of scale".

2021 Prize: to **Mrs. Laure Fourtage** for her PhD: "Et après? A history of relief and reintegration assistance for Jewish survivors of Nazi camps".

2022 Prize: to **Mrs. Delphine Barré** for her PhD: "Mon Dieu! What is this country doing to me?" Trajectories and commitments of Jewish women in France (late 1930s - late 1940s)."

2023 Prizes: to Mrs. Céline Leglaive for her PhD in progress at Paris I Panthéon-Sorbone under the supervision of Professor Laura Hobson-Faure: « La philanthropie des juifs en France, le cas de Paris, entre fidélité et intégration, 1791-1939 », and to Mrs. Manon Banoun for her PhD in progress at Paris I Panthéon-Sorbone under the supervision of Professor Anne Nissen: « Les juifs dans la ville. Une analyse archéologique et topographique des quartiers juifs médiévaux (XIIe-XIVe)». Each prize is awarded 9.000€.

2024 Prize: to Mrs Sarah Lemligui for her PhD « Repenser l'aliya nord-africaine : les migrationsjuives d'Afrique du Nord vers le Bilād aš-šām et l'Egypte au XIXeme siecle », universities Paris I Panthéon-Sorbonne and Ben Gourion of the Negev under the supervision of Prof. Laura Hobson-Faure and Orit Ouaknine-Yekutieli.
