

Taking long-term action



2024 was a year of contrasts. It began in the shadows of October 7, of the trauma that befell Israelis and the Jewish diaspora, as the massacre carried out that day also reawakened painful memories of the Shoah. For the first time since the Second World War, Jewish people were killed by the hundreds for who they were, on the very soil of the country that was meant to be their inviolable refuge. Anyone who believes in the inalienable right to human life had to be shocked by the October 7

attacks.

And yet, through a cruel and painful reversal of words and values, a swath of global public opinion quickly robbed the victims of that status, rekindling the old anti-Semitic cliché of the Jews being the authors of their own fate. Worse, some rejoiced in this flood of hatred. Even before the armed response of the Israeli government, an unending tsunami of anti-Semitism began to spread, particularly in Western countries.

And though we have so many reasons to lament, we must also recognise that this ordeal has strengthened our resilience. The Foundation must, in these times, remain faithful to its missions and stay the course, despite the circumstances. Eighty years after the liberation of the Nazi camps, transmission of the memory of the Shoah continues to elicit a great deal of interest, whether through the host of documentaries produced on the subject in 2024, or the record number of school trips to memorial sites, in both France and across Europe.

In the face of unbearable falsehoods and perilous short-cuts, we are committed to not diluting the complexity of the facts and to taking long-term action. We will therefore continue to support research on the Shoah and other genocides, initiatives that combat anti-Semitic prejudices, as well as those that promote a dynamic and thriving French Jewish culture. This is our *raison d'être*.

Rising to the challenge

The terrorist attack of 7 October 2023 in Israel triggered a sequence of events whose repercussions we are still trying to manage. As anti-Semitism has risen dramatically, both here and around the world, the Foundation has been faced with a surge in requests from around the globe, to respond to needs born of this emergency: first, those of Holocaust survivors in Israel and in France, to help them through this new ordeal that has revived painful memories of a traumatic past. The other priority is protecting Jewish community spaces, which are being directly threatened by the exacerbated anti-Semitism. In addition, projects tied to October 7th and its aftermath examined by the Combatting anti-Semitism and Fostering Intercultural Dialogue Committee have become eligible for funding.

In dealing with this unprecedented situation, we have been able to draw on our time-tested policy for choosing the projects that the Foundation will support. This is a vital barometer for managing the record number of requests processed in 2024. We can take comfort in the unflagging interest of project owners – memorial sites, artistic and culture sites, teachers, publishers, researchers, production companies... – seeking to transmit the memory of the Shoah to every type of audience. But this surge has also taken place just as the financial situation is being made more precarious by powerful and ongoing fluctuations in financial markets, driving down the endowment to close to its statutory minimum.

In this uncertain environment, the Foundation is moving forward as it has since its inception: with equanimity, a sense of responsibility and fairness. It was under these exceptional circumstances that we took the initiative, in September 2024, to hold a meeting of the volunteer members of Foundation bodies, committees and the Board of Directors, along with our permanent staff, to trade experiences and brainstorm about the challenges we face, both today and in future. It is thanks to them and their expertise that the Foundation's label is recognised unanimously as a guarantee of quality and intellectual rigour. At a time when some of these volunteers are nearing the end of their term while others are coming on board, I would like to extend my deepest thanks for their invaluable commitment to our common purpose.

The Foundation for the Memory of the Shoah

The Foundation for the Memory of the Shoah was created in 2000 in recognition of the French government's responsibility in the Shoah.

The FMS is a private and public-interest foundation. The initial endowment of €393 million came from the restitution by the government and certain financial institutions of dormant accounts from expropriated Jews living in France.

With the funds generated by this endowment, the Foundation subsidises the Shoah Memorial and supports projects that help to expand and transmit knowledge about the Shoah and other genocides; provides assistance to survivors; promotes the Jewish culture; and finally, combats anti-Semitism by fostering intercultural dialogue.













More than 6,400 projects financed

Since its creation, the Foundation for the Memory of the Shoah has allocated a total of around €420 million to finance more than 6,400 projects.

All of the projects submitted to the Foundation are evaluated independently, then examined by six thematic committees (History of Anti-Semitism and the Shoah; Memory and Transmission; Shoah Education; Jewish Culture; Solidarity; and Combatting Anti-Semitism and Fostering Intercultural Dialogue) made up of volunteer experts.

Projects recommended by the committees are submitted to the Foundation's Executive Board and the Board of Directors, which determine which projects will be supported and the funding they will receive.

The Financial Committee, chaired by a magistrate from the French Court of Auditors, ensures the preservation of the endowment and monitors the use of funds.



Over 18 million euros allocated in 2024

More than €10 million were allocated to 404 projects in 2024, which represents 58% of the Foundation's budget (see p. 6 and 7 for details).

The Foundation is also the primary source of financing for the Shoah Memorial. It covers close to 40% of its funding, in particular for the sites in Paris, Drancy and Orléans. It also provides support for renovation projects at the Memorial in Paris.

The Foundation is committed to a policy of keeping its operating costs under control. They represented around 10% of its total budget in 2024.

→ Evolution of the Foundation's funding









In 2024, the History of Anti-Semitism and the Shoah Committee awarded funding or research grants to 28 researchers. Half of them were either non-French or working on projects outside of France.

The Memory and Transmission Committee provided support to long-standing partners such as the Union des Déportés d'Auschwitz, the Yad Vashem Institute, which engages in both national and international actions, as well as initiatives to build local Memorials to the deportation (in Guéret, Lyon, Mayenne, Reillanne...).

The number of requests for school trips to Shoah memorial sites in France and Europe submitted to the **Shoah Education** Committee reached record levels, a sign that teachers continue to view them as relevant ways to transmit this history.


The Foundation supports projects for the preservation of Jewish Culture (notably Yiddish and Judeo-Spanish) and its transmission, through educational projects and events geared to a broader public.

As part of the Gordin Foundation (see p.11), 12 loans or grants were awarded to Jewish schools to finance construction work in 2024. Funding was also provided to support the FSJU Latalmid programme for school lunches.

Regarding Solidarity for Shoah survivors, the Foundation is committed to providing ongoing support for several trusted partners (including Adiam Solidarité, Casim, Casip-Cojasor, the FSJU and the Œuvre de Secours aux Enfants (OSE)). It continues to support several social programmes in Israel and in Eastern Europe that work with Shoah survivors.

Lastly, the Foundation works to combat anti-Semitism and promote intercultural dialogue. In 2024, it renewed its support for partners such as the Jewish Community Protection Service (SPCJ), Conspiracy Watch, UEJF and SOS Racisme.

Ongoing support for the Shoah Memorial

The Shoah Memorial is the leading partner of the Foundation for the Memory of the Shoah. Thanks to permanent support from the Foundation, the Memorial has been able to develop and host an increasing number of visitors (individuals, school groups, researchers, etc.) and expand its activities relating to archival collections and training. In 2012, the Foundation financed the creation of the Drancy Memorial, which is run by the Shoah

Memorial of Paris.

The Shoah Memorial has an exceptional archive collection: in 2024, it received an especially large intake of drawings, watercolours, paintings and artefacts, while the photo library grew by thousands of photos, films and testimonies.

In recent years, the Paris institution has incorporated other memorial sites in France, to ensure the continuity of their missions and activities: the CERCIL - Musée Mémorial des Enfants du Vél d'Hiv' in Orléans (2018), the Memoral site of Chambon-sur-Lignon (2020), the Centre Culturel Jules-Isaac in Clermont-Ferrand (2021). Since July 2022, it has been running the Pithiviers railway station, from which six convoys carrying thousands of children - arrested during the Vel d'Hiv Roundup and deported after their parents – left for Auschwitz.

The Memorial is also an educational and training site recognised by France's Ministry of National Education and the Inter-ministerial Delegation to Combat Racism, Anti-Semitism and Hatred for LGBTs. In addition to the many school groups it hosts, it organises study trips to Shoah sites, develops educational workshops in schools and offers teacher training sessions. Other professionals (police officers, judges, etc.) can also participate in dedicated training programmes.

Institutional partnerships

As part of a framework agreement, the Foundation for the Memory of the Shoah supports the three major federative institutions for French Judaism: the Representative Council of French Jewish Institutions (Conseil Représentatif des Institutions Juives de France, CRIF), the Central Consistory (Consistoire Central) and the Unified Jewish Social Fund (Fonds Social Juif Unifié, FSJU).

The agreement with the CRIF focuses on the particular issue of combating anti-Semitism. The agreement with the Consistory covers education, with the development of a programme for youth and improving rabbinical training for non-religious issues. Lastly, the agreement with the FSJU covers both social and cultural aspects (notably the online **Akadem** campus).

In 2024, the Foundation also renewed its support for the Fondation du Camp des Milles, particularly for its mediation initiatives with schoolchildren and training programmes for adults.

The Foundation is also one of the main contributors to the Jewish Community Protection Service (Service de Protection de la Communauté Juive, SPCJ) which works closely with public authorities to oversee security in Jewish schools, places of worship, community institutions, and at multiple events.

The FMS is a partner in the National Competition on the Resistance and Deportation (Concours National de la Résistance et de la Déportation) alongside the Ministry of National Education,

the Ministry of Armed Forces and four other major foundations devoted to the memory of World War II.

The Foundation is a member of the French delegation to the International Holocaust Remembrance Alliance (IHRA). This organisation is dedicated to promoting research, education and memorial initiatives concerning the Shoah in a great many countries.

The Foundation for the Memory of the Shoah is a member of the French Centre for Funds and Foundations (Centre français des fonds et fondations).

The Fonds Myriam ceased operations in 2024, but the Foundation's financial commitment continues through the reimbursement of the Fund's loan.

THE GORDIN FOUNDATION FOR SCHOOL BUILDINGS

The Rachel and Jacob Gordin Foundation was created in 2008 to help finance projects for Jewish schools: acquisition of buildings, extensions, bringing properties up to code. Housed by the Foundation for the Memory of the Shoah, the Gordin Foundation partners with the FSJU, the Harevim Fund, the Rothschild and Sacta-Rashi Foundations, the French Judaism Foundation and the FMS. It supports Jewish schools through grants and loans (see p. 53 for the list of projects supported in 2024).


Supporting research

The Foundation supports research on anti-Semitic persecution, the Shoah and other genocides. It also supports research in other disciplines such as literature, sociology, philosophy, art history, political science,law...

The Foundation awards doctoral and post-doctoral grants and finances research trips and conferences. It also contributes to the dissemination of knowledge via funding for publications and translations. Lastly, it participates in the preservation and promotion of archives.

"With close to 50 projects financed, research in 2024 was especially diverse, covering the Shoah and the genocide of the Roma and the Tutsi. The largest number of projects were either in France (half) or pertained to France (a third), but covered a wide range of topics. From a chronological standpoint, they covered the events themselves (from the point of view of the victims, the persecutors or the saviours) and extended beyond to post-war testimonies and trials. Geographically, they cover Europe, from France to Russia, the United States and the Mediterranean basin. In terms of discipline, four-fifths of the projects explored history through the lens of literature, philosophy or the arts."

Keeping memory alive

Remembering the history of the Shoah and its implications is the driving purpose of the Foundation for the Memory of the Shoah. To this end, it supports memory initiatives (commemorations, plaques, memorial stones) and projects that support the transmission of this history and help to illuminate sometimes little-known aspects: books, films, exhibits, plays... The Foundation also supports most of the major museum projects concerning the internment, deportation and rescue of Jews in France.

The Foundation contributes to the preservation and transmission of survivor accounts. It has been publishing a collection of Testimonies of the Shoah since 2004 (see p.29).



"In 2024, monuments in memory of deported Jews were erected in Lyon, Guéret and Reillanne, in other words, in a big city, a small town and a village. It is through these memorials that the tragic history of the Shoah is being firmly embedded across our country. The Committee is always mindful of the impact of the projects it recommends, especially if they help to relate a little-known or forgotten piece of that history. Once again this year funding was provided for a large number of films. Their airing on television, and later online for several months allowed them to reach a large audience, whether retracing the journey of a deported man (Benjamin Orenstein, Lili Keller-Rosenberg, Esther Senot, Alfred Nakache...) or telling the story of a concentration camp (Bedeau, Beaune-la-Rolande).

Among the projects that also attracted the Committee's attention, plays such as *Juste Irena* and *On ne jouait pas à la pétanque dans le ghetto de Varsovie (We didn't play bocci in the Warsaw ghetto)* testify to the relevance of live theatre as a means of transmission, to an audience of all ages.

Dozens of unprecedented and innovative projects continue to emerge. We welcome these original memorial and cultural initiatives that help deepen knowledge of the Shoah, and to build our collective memory."

Testimonies of the Shoah series

The "Testimonies of the Shoah" series publishes the accounts of Jews persecuted by the Nazis and their collaborators. Whether they were deported, interned or hidden during

the war, the authors recount their personal experiences, shedding light on the various aspects of the unprecedented crime of the Shoah. The series also includes accounts from Resistance members and those who worked to save Jews. It provides the public with texts that have never been published before or have been unavailable.

Each testimony is examined by a reading committee chaired by Serge Klarsfeld, and which includes Shoah survivors and historians. Published by Le Manuscrit, the testimonies are available (in French) in a selection of bookstores and on the Internet, in paper or digital format.

The series now includes some 100 works.

A major figure in the memory of the Shoah, Charles Baron has been particularly invested in transmission to schoolchildren, sensitive to the fact that he was

deported at only 16, not long after his parents, who were assassinated at Auschwitz-Birkenau, were deported. Charles survived two years of forced labour at Auschwitz, at Dachau and escape from a forced evacuation convoy.

Teaching the history of the Shoah

The Foundation encourages the transmission of the history of Shoah and other genocides to schoolchildren. It supports educational initiatives and training sessions for teachers. As a partner of the National Competition on the Resistance and Deportation (CNRD), it participates in the creation of educational resources.

The Foundation provides funding, either directly or through the Shoah Memorial, for a great many field trips to memorial sites, in France and across Europe. It pays particular attention to the preparation of these trips, and to the student reports and work done afterwards.



"The first years post-Covid suggested that school trips to Shoah memorial sites were being forsaken but, over the past two years, we have seen that this is not the case. The applications processed by the Teaching Committee reveal a tremendous commitment amongst teachers to guiding their students through lengthy projects that enable them to gain a deep understanding of every aspect of the Shoah: from Nazi ideology to the adoption of anti-Semitic laws, and the implementation of the extermination of the Jews. While visiting Auschwitz-Birkenau remains the top destination for school trips, the Committee has been gratified to discover that its past recommendations encouraging trips to the many memorial sites in France (Paris, Drancy, Maison d'Izieu, Chambon, Cercil d'Orléans, camp des Milles in Aix-en-Provence...) appear to have been heard."
















Transmitting Jewish Culture

From its inception, the Foundation has been committed to transmitting and fostering the legacy of the millennia-old Jewish culture, entire swaths of which were annihilated during the Holocaust. It supports the many aspects of Judaism, with particular emphasis on education to ensure the transmission of Jewish culture from generation to generation. To this end, its supports training programmes for teachers and youth programme directors, as well as pedagogical projects for Jewish and Talmud Torah schools.

The Foundation also helps promote Jewish culture in civil society by funding cultural events, classes and lecture series for the general public. It is especially attuned to initiatives that promote Yiddish and Judeo-Spanish languages and cultures.

Lastly, it supports Jewish studies through university research grants, and by encouraging the translation of important Jewish texts.



"After October 7th, what greater challenge for the Jewish Culture Committee than putting even greater emphasis on the impact of its actions?

Passionate advocate for a positive, demanding and enriching Jewish culture – a *sine qua non* of the vitality of Judaism in France – the Committee has increased its support for initiatives aimed at promoting a culture that thinks, that's alive, that transmits itself and radiates. In 2024, support was given to more than 80 such projects, in the areas of publishing, research, music, theatre, heritage and audiovisual media. Seminal works (the Israelite Seminary of France, by Y. Bitty, from Flavius Josèphe to Ernest Renan by Mr. Hadas-Lebel), first-time translations (Les Juifs de Belleville by B. Schlevin, Séjour à rebours by J. Glatstein, Cosmopolite by S. Zweig...), conferences (La Kabbale de Safed), exhibitions, festivals (Israeli Film Festival, International Jewish Film Festival), artistic works, as well as educational tools (Mon premier siddour éd. Koren) and digital innovations (online version of Tenou'a): the Foundation has bolstered the vitality of a plural and contemporary Jewish culture

Special attention was given to transmission to younger generations. Supporting youth organisations, training programmes, study seminars, educational and cultural projects across the country helped to strengthen the ties between Judaism, commitment and creative transmission, while laying the groundwork for future avenues.

In this time of upheaval, the Foundation has chosen to build. It supports those who create, teach, preserve and transmit. It is helping to vitalise a Jewish culture fully rooted in its time, and one that is essential for the future."

Support for Shoah survivors

Solidarity towards Shoah survivors and those who have suffered anti-Semitic persecution is one of the top priorities of the Foundation for the Memory of the Shoah. The Foundation finances specific programmes established by social and medical institutions. These programs aim to meet the needs of Shoah survivors by offering targeted services: listening, guidance, psychological support, home care services, support services for individuals with Alzheimer's, and assisted-living residences. The Foundation also works to reduce the isolation of survivors by supporting associations that offer them group activities and cultural events. Today, approximately 3,000 Shoah survivors can benefit from these particular services.

In addition, the Foundation for the Memory of the Shoah provides assistance for survivors in Israel and Eastern Europe, particularly those whose situations are the most critical, through programmes created by charitable associations.

"Helping Holocaust survivors, the deported, the orphans and hidden children of the Shoah, is one of the Foundation's priorities and, as such, the recipient of the largest portion of its budget. As always, the Committee devoted itself to meeting the needs of a special group, as fully as possible. For several years now, it has been working to adapt to the rapid changes in this group. In 2024, with the approval of the Board of Directors, it established an innovation fund that created the ability to select projects that propose updating both funding goals as well as financing and subsidy management methods. This year, the Committee also focused on requests for material or psychological aid, tied to the traumas reawakened by the terrorist attack of 7 October 2023, amongst Holocaust survivors in both France and Israel.

Despite which, the Committee has remained unflagging in its efforts to allow Holocaust survivors to keep living at home, thanks to ongoing support from Plan France that has made it possible to scale up what is a profoundly important initiative for the Foundation.

The two objectives – doubling the number of victims of anti-Semitic persecution receiving home care through German funds, and a doubling of these funds in France – were largely exceeded in 2024. Holocaust survivors are better informed thanks to campaigns carried out by a large number of cities, enabling those who were not aware of their rights or not benefitting from existing mechanisms to register for both. Based on a partnership with the Claims Conference, the programme made it possible to obtain a 40% increase in the budgets in France for this international organisation, between 2024 and 2025. This is a major success which, I am certain, will make it possible

better cover needs exacerbated by the aging of this group of people, the youngest of whom are over 80.

Galvanising, encouraging, supporting: the Foundation knows that, to accomplish these missions that are so important to survivors, it can rely on committed, devoted, well-organised partners located across the country. I would like to take this opportunity to thank them all most sincerely."

Combatting anti-Semitism

The Foundation for the Memory of the Shoah supports the combat against anti-Semitism, as well as initiatives that foster intercultural dialogue. In conjunction with the teaching of history, the Foundation supports educational and citizen initiatives, aimed specifically at fighting prejudice and insidious misconceptions. While the goal is to reach young people, the Foundation also supports events, publications and cultural productions geared to a wider public.

One of the Committee's priorities is to develop initiatives aimed at stemming the spread of hate speech on the **internet** and on **social media**.

The virulence and violence of contemporary anti-Semitism have made safety a particularly pressing issue.

In order to identify and understand anti-Semitism and its recent developments, the Committee supports research and monitoring in this area.

Lastly, the Foundation funds initiatives working to foster **intercultural dialogue** and mutual understanding.



"The Combatting anti-Semitism and Fostering Intercultural Dialogue Committee reached its 10th anniversary in 2024, a milestone marked by gravity and sorrow. In this period of heightened tension, the Committee provides vital support to ensure the safety of Jewish community spaces (synagogues, schools), which are being directly threatened by a particularly unbridled anti-Semitism since the terrorist attack by Hamas on Israel on 7 October 2023.

But the Foundation is not resigned to only treat emergencies. It has continued to support projects aimed at dismantling and combatting anti-Semitic prejudices: whether articles in Revue K, a watchdog in the battle against anti-Semitism, the mahJ exhibition on Alfred Dreyfus, a symbol of the tireless quest for truth and justice, and documentaries on the republican figures, Léon Blum and Jean Zay, who remained deeply devoted public servants in France despite the anti-Semitic harassment they endured.

Training is a top priority for the Foundation. Which is why it provides support to foundations and associations working to promote dialogue, such as Fondapol and the Fondation Jean-Jaurès which is devoted to raising awareness amongst elected officials, along with the UEJF students who are working in an especially difficult environment at the moment.

If the battle against anti-Semitism is a combat to be waged at every instant, more than ever before it must go hand in hand with a dialogue between cultures and peoples. The Combatting anti-Semitism and Fostering Intercultural Dialogue Committee is deeply committed to doing just that."

Rigorous, hands-on management

Chaired by a magistrate from the Court of Auditors, the Financial Committee for the Foundation for the Memory of the Shoah works to maintain the value of the endowment and to make the best use of its revenue. The Committe defines and closely monitors the investment strategy. In managing financial risk and performance, it seeks to provide the Foundation with sufficient funds to meet current needs without compromising its ability to act in the future. The Foundation's staff ensures the daily management of the fund, with the support of qualified advisors.

The Financial Committee also works to ensure **good governance** of the Foundation. It monitors budgetary decisions and weighs in on the most important projects, notably those that entail a long-term commitment by the FMS. The committee places particular emphasis on the **assessment of these multiannual projects**. It also pays very close attention to the proper management of the Foundation's operating costs.

TRIBUTE TO PHILIPPE UZAN

It was with tremendous sadness that we learned of the sudden passing of Philippe Uzan, at the age of 54, on 12 December 2024.

Joining the Financial Committee in 2022, he lent his thoughtful expertise to the smooth management of the endowment. He also took a keen interest in every aspect of the Foundation..



"After a satisfactory year in 2023, we experienced disappointing financial outcomes in 2024. Turbulence in the markets and political uncertainty, in both France and abroad, brought the endowment down to close to its original level of €393 million. In response to this situation, the Committee amended the system of allocations, to improve its future earnings prospects.

To ensure that the Foundation continues to have the means to support its actions, notably in the combat against anti-Semitism which has become a priority since 7 October 2023, the Board of Directors authorised the transfer of a small fraction of the endowment. This became necessary in a situation where expenditures continue to exceed revenues, and the endowment is nearing its statutory minimum. Beyond its symbolic value, the endowment is the guarantor of the Foundation's long-term existence. Under these difficult circumstances, the Financial Committee alerted the Board of Directors to the need for vigilance when committing to spending in 2025, and on the duty to replenish the initial capital, in accordance with our statutes.

This decrease in revenue, which has been ongoing for several years, also drove the Financial Committee to look deeper into different investment scenarios, to take the increasingly volatile financial environment into account."
